Annual Educational Report Cover Letter

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2021-22 educational progress for Whitmore Lake Elementary School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2021-22 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2021-22. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school does not have a label.

Students with disabilities and multiple risk factors including being economically disadvantaged or reporting multiple races scored significantly below state averages in most grade levels and in both content areas assessed. There continues to be large achievement gaps between the top 30 percent of students and the bottom 30 percent of students. To help improve these test scores, Whitmore Lake Elementary staff and students have made changes to improve literacy remediation and curriculum alignment. Staff have been trained to use Lucy Calkins reading and writing units of instruction, as well as Orton-Gillingham strategies. And to accelerate reading achievement, classroom teachers, reading interventionists, literacy coaches, and teacher consultants are working together to analyze individual student reading data. Students falling below grade level proficiency receive an Individualized Reading Improvement Plan (IRIP) to improve reading achievement in

an effort to become proficient by third grade. Additionally, a new Mathematics curriculum with assessments has been implemented to align better with the state standards. Student data is reviewed multiple times per year with frequent progress monitoring guiding instruction. With these changes in place, the staff and students expect to close the achievement gap in the future while maintaining a safe learning environment with responsible and respectful community members.

State law requires that we also report additional information. Unless otherwise noted, the following information is valid for both the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years:

1. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

Whitmore Lake Public Schools has only one elementary school which houses Kindergarten through grade 6 during both school years. All students in the grades listed attended Whitmore Lake Elementary School unless they had an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) that placed them in an alternative environment outside the district. A separate magnet program for Montessori instruction allows for open enrollment for all Whitmore Lake residents and those who reside in nearby communities, K-5th grades.

2. THE STATUS OF THE 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN The Whitmore Lake Elementary School Improvement Plan in 2020-2021 included the addition of Writing Essentials units or writing to further literacy achievement. Orton Gillingham workshops helped teachers of students with disabilities learn to teach reading with multi-modal strategies, when content from traditional instruction was not mastered. In 2021-2022, the plan emphasized growth in the areas of Math curriculum and assessment alignment to support all learners.

3. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL

Currently, there are no specialized schools within Whitmore Lake Public Schools. Our district consists of two buildings, without overlapping grade spans: Whitmore Lake Elementary is K-6th grades, Whitmore Lake High School is 7th-12th grades. Students at Whitmore Lake Elementary have the option to enroll into the magnet Montessori program for grades K-5th. Students at Whitmore Lake High School have access to Early College Alliance (ECA), Washtenaw Alliance of Virtual Education (WAVE), Washtenaw International Baccalaureate High School and Middle School (WIHI). These are operated by Eastern Michigan University and/or the Washtenaw Intermediate School District (WISD). High School students in grades 11 and 12 also have access to Livingston county's career and technical education program.

4. IDENTIFY HOW TO ACCESS A COPY OF THE CORE CURRICULUM, A DESCRIPTION OF ITS IMPLEMENTATION, AND AN EXPLANATION OF THE VARIANCES FROM THE STATE'S MODEL

All Whitmore Lake Public Schools follow the State of Michigan Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCEs) and High School Content Expectations (HSCEs), which can be accessed at www.mde/qov. There are no variances from the state's model. A description of core curriculum implementation for both school years can be provided by each building principal. They can answer any specific questions you may have about any component of our curriculum. Parents can also request a copy of the core curriculum from the building principal.

5. THE AGGREGATE STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT RESULTS FOR ANY LOCAL COMPETENCY TESTS OR NATIONALLY NORMED ACHIEVEMENT TESTS Whitmore Lake Elementary students took the Northwest Educational Assessment (NWEA) in the Fall of 2020-2021 school year and again in the Fall of 2021-2022. Their mean RIT scores for both years were as follows:
